Our next game was against Whaimana Ako (Taranaki), HHT won this match, 13-3. At the end of the game, we had the opposing team's coach come over and praise one of our girls, Tennessee Ahu, for amazing sportswomanship and just "keeping the vibe up". This brought the vibe up even more for our team!

After a short break we played our third game against Pua-wananga (Wairarapa). This is where our girls were feeling it physically the most, but they definitely persevered through, winning this match 15-7. We then, thankfully, had a bye. We had lunch together and prepared for our last game. Our final match was played against our hosts Whakatipuria (Palmerston North). Our team was drained from the day, but still some absolutely amazing netball was played! HHT won this game and the final score was 11-8.

Knowing we won the entire tournament, our girls were over the moon! Our hard work had paid off and we knew we were bringing that trophy back to kura! After having a little victory dance to ourselves, we had prize giving. Here we were given our trophy, which our captain, Omapere Heke, received on our behalf and gave thanks to the people who made the day possible. There were also spot prizes given to Shakira Colston and myself chosen by lucky dip. Overall, I am very proud of our girls for their hard work and dedication to playing and making it on the day! We deserved the win and couldn't be happier with it!




Student Contribution — Paris Hinton


