## Women's Words 125 Years of Suffrage

It is not every day that an invitation to Government House arrives in your mail box but arrive it did. Anastasia Turley and Catherine Motusia together with Teacher in Charge, Paula Hay, were invited to Government House to celebrate 125 years of Women's Suffrage with the Govenor General, Dame Patsy Reddy, Sir David Gascoigne and their Royal Highnesses, the Duke and Duchess of Sussex. The Duchess gave a speech recognising the role that New Zealand played as the first country in the world to give women the vote and emphasised the importance of "being able to participate in the choices for your future and that of your community, the involvement and voice that allows you to be a part of the very world that you are a part of."

Anastasia described the event as "nerve wracking but very exciting." First impressions of Government House were of a beautiful building in an historic setting. "It was amazing to be in that environment with so many amazing women doing exciting things. It was an honour to represent HHT. " She found the speeches empowering, especially Meghan Markle's about women's strength and that of New Zealand's poet laureate, Dame Selina Tusitala Marsh, inspiring. "I left feeling like I could do anything."

Other activities included kapa haka, bush walking, weaving and zip-lining. My favourite one was designing my very own koauau, an ancient Māori flute. On the fourth day we hosted our very own powhiri to all our teachers and whanau helpers.

I was asked to give the karanga or calling people onto the marae. We then said a karakia and performed a bracket of kapa haka followed by a hāngī feast and pudding. Thank you, once again, for giving me such an amazing opportunity.


